He set an average speed record of 101.127 mph that would stand for seven years and was the first 500 winner to

average more than 100 mph.

Norm Batten was DePaolo's relief driver and took the wheel while DePaolo had his blistered hands treated and bandaged. Batten was not as aggressive and when DePaolo returned to the race he had to work his way back to the front. When Dave Lewis wasted a pit stop, DePaolo regained the lead and
