AFTER SEVEN SEASONS ALLOWING single-seater cars, the AAA switched rules and again required a ride-along mechanic. Other rule changes targeted engine design, so in 1930 car owners were busy modifying their cars or building new ones.

Almost as soon as the race began, Billy Arnold was in the lead and never gave it up. With mechanic Spider

Matlock at his side, Arnold built up such a lead he crossed the finish line more than seven minutes before his closest challenger, Shorty Cantlon.

Driver Cy Marshall had his brother Paul as his mechanic. Their car went over the wall, killing Paul and critically injuring Cy. He recovered but did not appear again in the 500 except once 17 years later when he came in eighth.





**"Fix Paul Up First," Marshall Brother Moans, Not Knowing Hope Was Gone**

**CAR JUMPS WALL; MECHANIC KILLED**  
Paul Marshall Victim—Tragedy Averted In Sensational Car Smash.

**Fix Paul up first,** Marshall brother moans, not knowing hope was gone.

Regretful consciousness for a moment, while lying on an operating table in the emergency hospital at the Speedway yesterday, Cy Marshall remembered this request to his brother Paul Marshall, who was working desperately to save his life.

James Paul, Cy's brother, never knew of Cy's expression of brotherly love.

He died in the hospital without regaining consciousness.

Persevered Brother to Take Him.

Cy's brother, who drove the car in which his brother met death, himself is in a critical condition in the city hospital.

Physician said late last night that he was running well, however. The full extent of his injuries had not been ascertained.

It was Paul Marshall's first appearance in the "big one" racing game. He had never ridden in a race before, according to those who
