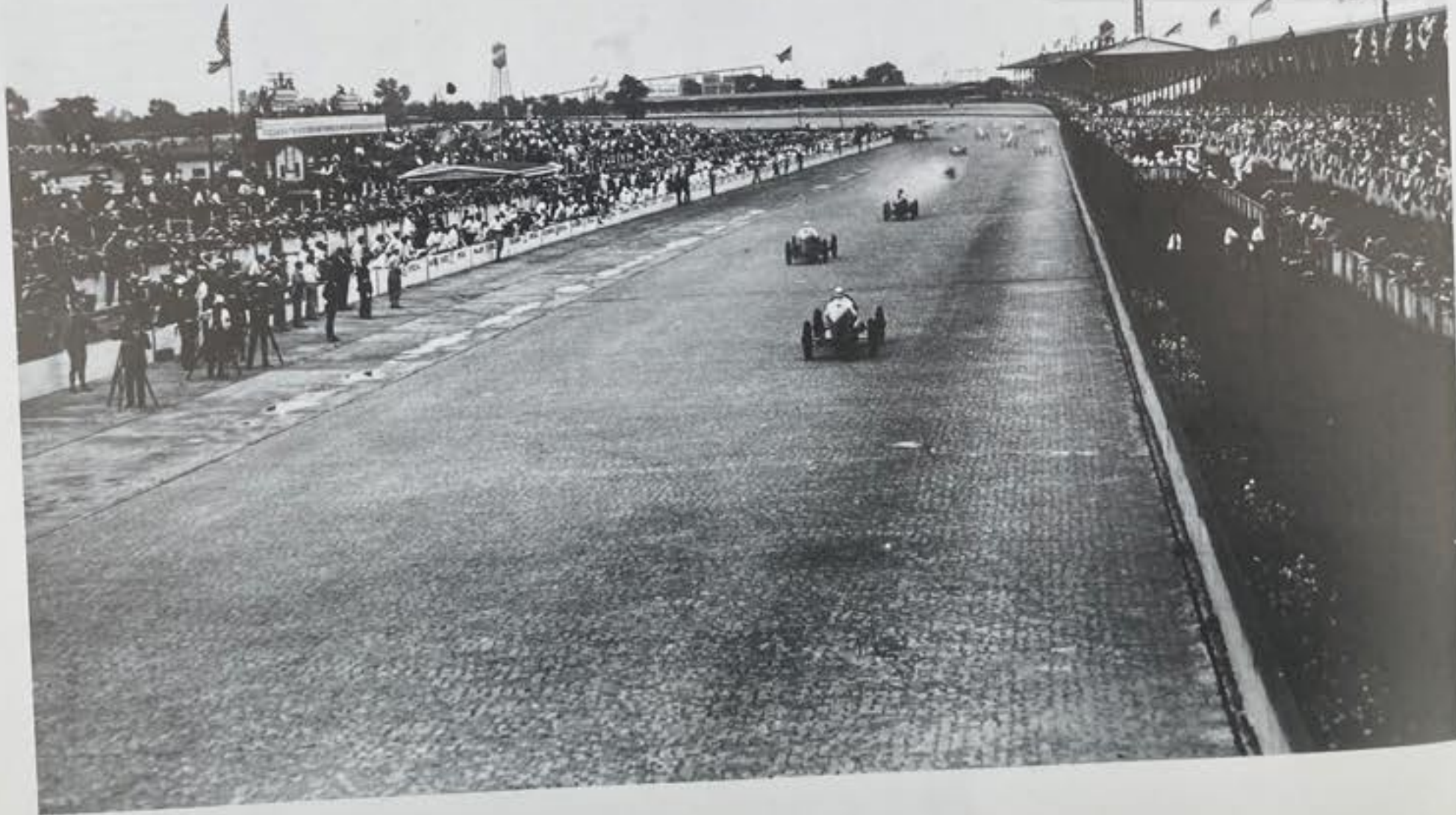

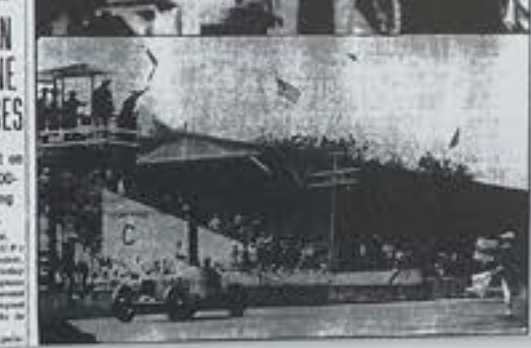

Billy Arnold, the 25-year-old Chicago daredevil who saw the checkered flag wave him to victory two years ago and who suffered serious injuries last year while leading the pack of drivers at 400 miles, provided the major thrill of the day when he shot his car over the outside wall of the northeast turn to prevent a collision with the racer ahead of him.

Arnold's Car Turns Over.

Arnold was traveling approximately 111 miles an hour at the time. He was out in front, with 144 miles behind him, when the car bounded over the wall and overturned on its side.

Spider Matlock, 31 years old, of Los Angeles, Cal., Arnold's riding mechanic, suffered the most serious injuries of the race. His pelvic bone was fractured and he suffered numerous painful bruises. Arnold escaped with a broken collarbone and bruises. The condition of neither is serious, attending physicians reported.
