THE FRONT ROW WAS THE SAME AS THE PREVIOUS YEAR: REX MAYS, WILBUR SHAW AND MAURI ROSE. SHAW WAS IN THE lead with 48 laps to go and might have picked up his third consecutive win but crashed.

Instead, the race became the second 500 in which two drivers shared the win. Mauri Rose started from the pole position and had an early lead, but his Maserati was sidelined with mechanical problems. He then took the wheel of Floyd Davis' car and maneuvered from the back of the pack to retake the lead and get the win.

Driver Everett Saylor was badly injured in a crash and not expected to live. He recovered, but almost exactly one year later was killed in a dirt track race in Missouri.
